Moananui is a Nelson-based blue economy cluster, whose shared goal is to transform New Zealand into a world-leading ecosystem for developing and commercialising blue economy products, services, technology, research and capability, with a healthy ocean at the heart of this.

Moananui's role is to enable businesses, government bodies and other experts to work together with the aim of fast-tracking growth of the 'blue economy' - marine activities that generate economic value and contribute positively to social, cultural and ecological wellbeing. Here in Te Tauihu, we have the largest and fastest growing blue economy in Aotearoa New Zealand.

Moananui plays a key role in our region supporting businesses with projects that increase value, connect people and improve ocean health.



Invest in Nelson Tasman

Nelson Tasman has always been a sought after destination famous for its unique environment, sunny climate and favourable growing conditions.

Our region is one of the country's fastest growing destinations, and for good reason. A microcosm of the whole country, Nelson Tasman manages to squeeze everything that's great about New Zealand into one easily accessible area.

Our region has a rich history and interwoven story of migration from Tangata Whenua and European settlers through the diverse communities of people who now call Nelson Tasman home, creating a truly multicultural society.

Here in Nelson Tasman, the land and sea shape our way of life and consequently, our regional economy. Our stunning natural landscapes draw visitors from all corners of the world, our favourable growing conditions mean we farm the most outstanding produce and the oceans that surround us make us the natural home for New Zealand's blue economy.



Our economy and people are globally connected. We ship our produce and innovative products all around the world from here. We are the geographical centre of New Zealand, lay claim to one of the country's busiest regional airports and are home to the largest fishing port in Australasia.

Good things start here – Nelson Tasman is the birthplace and home of New Zealand's first and largest public-benefit science organisation, first centre for musical arts, first state-supported secondary school and first provincial museum. Even New Zealand's first game of rugby was played right here in Nelson Tasman.

Our innovative and pioneering spirit persists to this day. Our region is home to an array of high achievers and innovative businesses. Some were born here, others chose to move here because of the unique lifestyle offering. As a place where talent wants to live, Nelson Tasman gives space to explore, create and innovate.




Based at Port Nelson, QuayPack offers integrated transportation services, third-party logistics (3PL), and packing solutions. The company utilises New Zealand's largest on-port covered storage facilities and dedicated scheduled trucking services. QuayPack also works with partner QuayConnect to handle all aspects of logistics across the supply chain.

PORT NELSON

Port Nelson is the maritime gateway for Te Tauihu – a vital hub for economic activity and a key stakeholder in our region's continued growth and prosperity. The Port offers a comprehensive range of services, including marine operations, cargo handling, warehousing, logistics, slipway services, and an extensive property portfolio. Annually, the port handles approximately 3.3 million tonnes of cargo, which includes around 120,000 twentyfoot equivalent containers (TEU). The cargo volume breakdown comprises approximately 67% exports and 33% imports. Key export commodities include forestry products (logs, sawn timber, and processed timber), seafood, pip fruit, and wine. Notably, Port Nelson plays a vital role in the wine industry's supply chain, as 70% of New Zealand's wine is produced in the Marlborough region. On the import side, major commodities include fuel, vehicles, cement, and methanol.

Additionally, Port Nelson accommodates one of New Zealand's largest marine service sectors, further strengthening its significance in the maritime industry.



Why Nelson Tasman

Nelson Tasman has a strong base of longstanding anchor sectors of the economy, providing competitive advantages that have underpinned our economic performance and prosperity for decades.



Blue Economy

70% of New Zealand's aquaculture is based in Te Tauihu, the Top of the South — major companies like Talleys and Sealord work out of Port Nelson. Home to over 400 blue economy businesses, we have an expanding blue economy cluster, Moananui, representing industries such as pharmaceuticals, nutraceuticals, engineering, aquaculture and conservation/restoration.



Food, Beverage and Wellness Products

Nelson Tasman is fertile territory for growing primary produce. It is also increasingly fertile territory for innovators who are finding ways to add value through science, innovation, and savvy marketing.



Forestry and Wood Processing

Nelson Tasman's climate and geography are ideal for growing radiata pine and the region produces approximately 10% of New Zealand's sustainable roundwood harvest.



Research, Science and Technologies

Scientific understanding underpins many of the region's biggest and most innovative sectors. Nelson has the highest number of scientists per capita of any New Zealand city.



The Visitor Sector

Nelson Tasman is one of the fastest growing tourism regions in the country and has a long history of attracting both international and domestic visitors. Our natural environment is the heart of our visitor economy.



Wakatū Incorporation is a whānau-owned business whose purpose is to preserve and enhance taonga for the benefit of current and future generations.

Based in Whakatū (Nelson), Aotearoa New Zealand, Wakatū has approximately 4,000 owners, who descend from the customary Māori landowners, the whānau and hapū of the Whakatū, Motueka and Mōhua rohe.

Actively involved in the lives of whānau whānui, the wider community, and business development, Wakatū is guided by Te Pae Tawhiti, their 500-year intergenerational plan.


The key principles of Te Pae

Working primarily in the property, food and beverage, and wellness space, their three associated business are Whenua, Kono and AuOra.

Whenua is the foundation of Wakatū and is where 70% of their assets are held.

Kono is a food and beverage producer and exporter of premium wine, beer, cider, pip fruit and hops.

AuOra is a consumer-focused, healthsolutions business with a focus on active ingredients and wellbeing solutions, obtained from the natural resources of Wakatū.



Award-Winning Weather

Here in Nelson Tasman, we welcome charttopping sunshine hours and mild winters that contribute to the lifestyle you will find here. You can plan a Saturday barbecue or outdoor activity with confidence.

Transport

Here in Nelson Tasman, active transport is more popular than anywhere else in the country, thanks to significant investments in cycle paths, parks and shelters (and our trustworthy weather). Investments in public transport and strategic traffic network upgrades are reflecting the demands of our growing population. Most people living in Nelson Tasman own their own cars so naturally there is peak hour traffic congestion, but if you're moving from a bigger city then it's incomparable.

Connecting with the Country

Our state-of-the-art Nelson Airport caters for growth projections out to 2035. It's the busiest provincial airport in New Zealand. Wellington is a quick 25-minute flight away, and Christchurch is a scenic five hour drive.

Excellent Education

We have excellent schools, providing quality education. There are over 80 options for early childhood education in the region and numerous primary and secondary schools. Nelson College was founded in 1856 and was New Zealand's first state school. The Nelson Marlborough Institute of Technology/Te Pūkenga is the largest education provider in the Top of the South and has been providing students with the skills required to make their mark on the world for over 115 years.

A Diverse Population

With a population of around 113,000, we balance our urban offerings with a sense of a connected community. We embrace our diverse culture, where one in five people living here were born overseas, and there are 48 different cultures living in the region. We have over 1,500 sports, arts and culture events per year — there is something for everyone to enjoy.

Housing

Nelson and Tasman's population is growing; we know we need space for more houses and businesses, and there are developments underway to encourage more central city living. The region offers housing options to suit every budget, from central city rentals to hilltop hideaways, from new suburban subdivisions to several exciting new apartment complexes.

Healthcare

Our residents are comparatively wellserved across the healthcare spectrum. The government announced the \$1b redevelopment of Nelson Hospital and the project is on track to be completed by 2030 to ensure our residents have a fit for purpose, future-proof building.

About the Outdoors

Our stunning natural landscapes draw visitors from all corners of the world.

There are around 350 mountain bike trails, 250 hiking trails and 3 National Parks – Kahurangi, Nelson Lakes, and Abel Tasman – which offer access to lakes, mountains and some of the country's finest beaches. It's one big natural wonderland, making it almost impossible for you to ignore the call of the wild. Best of all, people of all ages and levels of fitness can enjoy our outdoors, as Tasman's Great Taste Cycle Trail demonstrates.

Founded in 2009 in Nelson by the Rodley family and has grown to over 40 people in 4 countries. In that time, Snap has won every NZ major technology, sustainability and innovation award it has been eligible for, as well as government and industry contracts around the world. It recently received the Nelson Supreme business award.

Snap builds the world's most powerful camera for image and AI monitoring for its size, including cloud and AI review systems. This technology is applied across fisheries, red meat & construction industries among others.

Snap holds a huge amount of video data available for training AI and growing automation, including one of the largest video data stores in the world from fishing vessels.

As we see sustainability, transparency and increased efficiency in the food industry, Snap is well positioned to capitalise on this global trend, while improving the lives of those who work on fishing boats and industries and the environmental footprint they entail.

A confident future – investment highlights

Nelson Tasman is at a significant stage of strategic development, investing heavily in key enabling infrastructure supporting our future growth.

The following section highlights some important strategic investments as context to investment requests.



✓ Waimea Community Dam

The Waimea Community Dam is a public/private partnership between the Tasman District Council and Waimea Irrigators Ltd. The \$195m project due for completion in February 2024 is a water augmentation scheme supporting our long term water security.

Environmental Investment

Te Tauihu is environmentally diverse, home to unique natural communities and a stronghold for a wide range of species and ecosystems which are rare and threatened elsewhere in New Zealand. Punching above our weight in investment and innovation around conservation and biodiversity restoration, regional leaders are helping to unlock philanthropic investment into conservation. This is underpinned by a highly collaborative ecosystem driven by the Kotahitanga mo te Taiao Alliance.

Marae Development: Te Āwhina Marae Redevelopment

Supporting the development aspirations of our marae in the rohe, which include housing initiatives/ papakāinga. This presents a complete redevelopment of the marae facilities in Motueka to support cultural revitalisation and economic development. The project provides for education, arts, employment, trade training, cultural tourism, and housing solutions

Urban Regeneration

Urban settlements are undergoing revitalisation and regeneration to enhance liveability and vibrancy, adapt to congestion, climate change, and changing retail behaviours. Nelson City Council is investing in projects such as the Bridge Street development as an active transport corridor and linear park offering green space for people in the heart of the city.



Nelson Arts & Creativity Strategy

This new strategy is Nelson City Council's guiding document for nurturing creativity, celebrating the arts, and channelling innovation and creation. It outlines initiatives that can help everyone experience the benefits of art and will support a sustainable arts and creativity sector.

Port Nelson Infrastructure Property Masterplan

Port Nelson is undertaking an Infrastructure/Property Masterplan to optimise infrastructure, asset, and property portfolio requirements for Port Nelson in 2050. This is to include a phased development programme. This will enable the Port's infrastructure to respond to future import and export requirements of Te Tauihu, support a cluster of businesses who need proximity to the Port and upgrade maritime infrastructure to support activities such as coastal shipping.

✓ Nelson Airport 2050 Masterplan

The Masterplan is a guide for Airport land use and a plan that allows provision for future activity in a flexible, efficient, and safe manner, that continues to support the community aspirations of Nelson Tasman.

Archives, Research and Collections Facility

It is widely acknowledged that the Nelson Provincial Museum's Isel Research Facility is at the end of its functional life. A replacement facility is urgently required to provide ongoing care for the Museum's nationally significant Regional Collection.

Science and Technology Ecosystem

Nelson has the highest number of scientists per capita of any New Zealand city and this sector has created the most jobs in the region over the past 10 years. Investment into the Cawthron Institute and Plant and Food Research New Zealand's assets, and a new Nelson Artificial Intelligence Institute has created international class facilities

Marina Masterplan

The Marina Masterplan envisions a link between the city and the marina precinct, complementing Te Ara ō Whakatū - Nelson City Centre Spatial Plan, Council's City to Sea Linkage, and the Nelson Future Access Project. Environmental and climate change factors are at the heart of the Masterplan and will help drive environmentally friendly and sustainable practices both in the building and development of the Marina as well as daily operations.

cost-efficient business, designed to get affordable drugs to market as quickly as possible and reduce the suffering of millions of humans and animals.

Kimer Med has demonstrated the effectiveness of its antivirals against seven viruses to date. These in vitro results include 100% effectiveness against Zika, and Dengue - a top ten global public health problem with hundreds of millions of cases annually causing devastating consequences.

Nelson Tasman, located in Te Tauihu, the Top of the South. It comprises the two Unitary Authorities of Nelson and Tasman and encompasses the multiple rohe of the eight iwi of Te Tauihu: Ngāti Tama ki Te Tauihu, Te Ātiawa o Te Waka-a-Māui, Ngāti Rārua, Ngāti Koata, Ngāti Toarangatira, Ngāti Kuia, Ngāti Apa ki te Rā Tō, and Rangitāne o Wairau.
